# URBAN LIBRARIES COUNCIL RECOGNIZES NASHVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY WITH 2021 INNOVATION AWARD

## Digital Inclusion Initiatives Has Transformative Impact on Community

**NASHVILLE, Tenn.** – The Urban Libraries Council announced Nashville Public Library as one of 10 Top Innovators during the 2021 Innovations Celebration held virtually on Jan. 21. The annual Innovations awards recognizes transformative programs that bridge digital divides, provide lifelong education opportunities, meet the needs of underresourced populations and improve essential library service delivery from ULC's member library systems across the U.S. and Canada.

NPL's Telehealth for Older Adults, part of the library's Digital Inclusion Initiatives, was selected by a panel of expert judges from more than 250 submissions in 10 categories that showcase creative thinking and imaginative applications of library resources. Digital Inclusion Initiatives, under the leadership of manager Marian Christmon, won in the category of Digital Equity and Citizenship, with award winners being recognized for their level of inventiveness, the outcomes achieved and the ability for other libraries to adapt and implement their work.

"We're deeply honored to be recognized as a Top Innovator by the ULC. The work that Marian and her team are doing is not only crucial to bridging the digital divide in Nashville — it's actively keeping our city's most vulnerable population safer," said Kent Oliver, director of NPL. "There's this assumption that because online resources have become so prominent and widespread that everyone can readily access them. That's not always the case, and ensuring equity in access, regardless of financial ability or social class, is a core tenant of our library that I'm very proud to offer to Nashville."

"Creativity and inventive approaches continue to thrive at ULC member libraries, and this year's winners are no exception," said Urban Libraries Council President and CEO Susan Benton. "This year's submissions highlight our libraries' remarkable capacity for leadership, commitment and determination during a time of continued change and

stress. We celebrate Nashville Public Library for developing a leading-edge program that will transform their library and community, serving as a model for all public libraries in North America."

The Telehealth for Older Adults program equips Nashville's senior population with the education, access and devices they need to receive healthcare, when possible, from the safety of their homes. During the pandemic, Telehealth use began to grow exponentially as people were seeking safer ways to access healthcare. Recognizing that older adults were the least prepared to do so, and the most vulnerable to social isolation, the staff of Digital Inclusion Initiatives focused services on those who do not have the financial means to acquire computer devices, in-home internet or training on their own, allowing them to be cared for and connected.

Nearly 250 Nashvillians benefited from Telehealth for Older Adults in 2021.
